
CROSS THE ATLANTIC ON THE COLUMBUS ROUTE

For their cruise to the New World, the SEA CLOUD and SEA CLOUD II take the same route across the Atlantic as Columbus did in 1492. But what the discoverer did not yet know back then, today guarantees many magnificent hours under sail: During the winter months, the trade winds provide ideal sailing conditions in a westward direction.

What are the trade winds?

When, close to the equator, the sun is almost vertical in the sky it shines straight down heating the air above the ocean surface.

Once warm, the air becomes lighter, rises and moves towards the poles on both sides of the equator. At around 30° north and 30° south, the masses of air have cooled to such an extent that they sink again and return to the equator in the form of steady westerly winds, known as the trade winds. This is what carries our two windjammers across the Atlantic with constant force.



"Given these ideal conditions, which have remained unchanged for centuries, we cover around 200 nautical miles (370 km) every day at an average speed of about 9.0 knots (16.7 km/h), mostly under sail." Captain Vladimir Pushkarev

Ideal sailing conditions

Sailors have been making use of the trade winds for centuries, and even today the SEA CLOUD and SEA CLOUD II can rely on these tropical winds to propel them across the seas. Every nautical mile covered brings you closer to summer. At the end of November, when the hurricanes over the Atlantic have long dissolved, our ships set sail from the Canaries, usually from Gran Canaria.

From that point, it gets a little warmer every single day. We first head South until we reach the trade winds, before setting a westward course that takes us to Barbados or Curaçao. The windjammers experience ideal sailing conditions for somewhere between 15 and 17 days, often even overnight, gliding towards a magnificent sunset every day.



A SPECTACULAR SAILING EXPERIENCE




